

# Financial Aid and Scholarships

Watch your mailbox for your merit-based scholarship information.
Apply for competitive scholarships.
Use the Net-Price Calculator to estimate merit-based scholarships and need-based financial aid you may qualify for.
File your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
Complete the Supplemental Scholarship Survey.

Cost matters when deciding where to go to college. Financing your education is made possible by four types of funding sources:

- Scholarships
- Grants
- Loans
- Employment

To be considered for the most opportunities, start by filing your Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

#### **Apply for Scholarships**

Michigan residents are eligible for Presidential Scholars Program awards, and non-Michigan residents are eligible for National Scholars Program awards. These merit-based scholarships are available to first-year students. While you may not have provided official SAT or ACT scores when you applied for admission, we recommend you submit official scores for additional scholarship consideration.

The following Michigan Tech competitive scholarships require additional application materials. Some deadlines are as early as November 15:

- Leading Scholar Award–November 15
- Summer Youth Scholars-December 1
- FIRST Robotics Scholarship—February 1
- Visual and Performing Arts Talent Award–February 15
- Thompson Scholars Program-Working Families Scholarship (Michigan residents only)—February 15

Also, start checking with your high school guidance office, community foundations, parent/guardian's place of employment, and other outside sources for additional scholarship opportunities.

# **Supplemental Scholarship Survey**

The Supplemental Scholarship
Application is used to award both
competitive scholarships, like the
Leading Scholar Award, and automatic
donor-funded scholarships to new
incoming students. Complete the
survey through the Leading Scholar
application process or through your
Husky Portal under the "Financial Aid"
tab. Students awarded these automatic
scholarships will receive notification
through their Michigan Tech
email account.

#### **Report Private Scholarships**

Many students earn scholarships from non-Michigan Tech sources-such as their high school, local foundations, or companies-that can be applied toward their cost of attendance at the school they choose to attend.

If you are awarded scholarships from non-Michigan Tech sources, you must report your scholarship(s) through your Financial Aid Portal under the "2026-2027 Outside Resources" section. You can follow the step-by-step instructions at mtu.edu/finaid/outside-scholarships

All reported scholarships will be applied to your Michigan Tech student account within two to three days of being reported and are considered placeholder amounts until we receive the scholarship check.

#### On-Campus Student **Employment**

At Michigan Tech, you'll find many opportunities for student employment. Even if you don't qualify for work-study (based on your FAFSA results), many departments on campus hire students for part-time jobs. On average, 2,000 students are employed on campus. Offcampus employment opportunities are also available.

#### Complete Your FAFSA

To be considered for all University-awarded financial aid, including grants, loans (for students and parents/guardians), work-study employment, and other aid, complete your FAFSA. File online at studentaid.gov using our federal school code: 002292. In order to process your FAFSA, Michigan Tech needs to have your social security number on file. To avoid delays in processing your FAFSA, please use your Husky Portal to provide your social security number. On the Financial Aid tab, enter your social security number in the section "Enter Your Social Security Number (SSN)."

File by the due dates listed below for the best opportunities. FAFSAs processed after these dates will receive consideration for remaining aid.

- 1. Students taking 12 to 18 credits per semester are charged the plateau rate listed above. Students taking fewer than 12 credits will be charged on a per-credit basis (resident: \$740; nonresident: \$1,648). This per-credit price also applies to any credit taken over 18 credits. Students attending summer semester will be charged the per-credit rate.
- 2. Students who have earned 60 or more credits, including transfer credit, credit earned through early college or dual enrollment, or AP, IB, or CLEP, will be charged upper-division tuition. For details, see mtu.edu/finaid/tuition/cost

#### **Complete Your Housing Contract**

Living on campus plays a critical role in your success as a first-year student. It helps you build independence, make new friends, develop important life skills, and connect with the support and resources you'll need to thrive at Michigan Tech. Because of its impact, all first-year students are required to live on campus during their first year.

If you are receiving a merit-based scholarship through the Presidential Scholars, National Scholars, or Leading Scholar programs, you'll need to live in University housing for your first two academic years.

Once you've paid your enrollment deposit, you can apply for housing starting in January by completing your residence hall contract in HuskyHouse, our housing services portal. Log in using your Michigan Tech SSO credentials. While new students don't have the opportunity to choose their specific room, you will have the opportunity to select your roommate. #### Complete Your Housing Profile

After completing your housing contract, you will need to fill out your housing profile. This information helps us match you with a roommate who is a good fit, based on your preferences. If you don't choose a roommate yourself, your profile will help us pair you with someone compatible.

#### **Choose a Roommate**

Once your contract and profile are complete, you will be eligible to participate in roommate matching, which opens in early March. You can:

- · Request a specific roommate you already know, or
- Search for a potential roommate who's a good match based on housing profiles.

You have until June 1 to enter your roommate choice. If you don't select a roommate by then, we'll assign one for you based on your housing profile.

Please note: Spring or summer students will be put on a waitlist and roommate matching is not available.

#### **Important Dates**

If you sign your housing contract, and complete roommate matching by June 1, your housing assignment and roommate information will be available in HuskyHouse starting July 1.

• If you complete your housing contract after June 1, or do not participate in roommate matching, you'll receive your assignment by August 1.

## **Residential Dining**

Meal plan options are tailored to meet a variety of dining preferences and needs within our community with flexibility and convenience. First-year students are required to select either the Premium Gold Unlimited or the 19 Meal Plan when signing a contract with Housing Services. These meal plans provide access to the largest number of meals per academic year, minimize the risk of food insecurity, and will ensure you have the nutritional support to be successful.

Our meal plans are carefully designed to meet a large majority of dietary needs. If you have additional dietary needs, a registered dietitian is available to offer complimentary one-on-one nutrition counseling, dining accommodations, and assistance navigating the dining halls with food allergies/intolerance. Husky Eats professional staff strive to accommodate all students and are ready to work with you to address questions or concerns regarding your meal plan or dining experience.

#### **Register for Commuter Parking**

If you will commute to campus, please register your vehicle and purchase your commuter parking permit online by visiting the Michigan Tech Parking Portal on the Transportation Services website before classes begin.

- Mid-July: Watch your MTU email for information on how to sign up for the permit waitlist and to purchase your permit.
- August: Permits will be available for pickup in person after being purchased online.
- Permits for motorcycles, scooters/mopeds, and snowmobiles are only available to purchase at the Transportation Services office in Room 100 of the Administration Building.
- Winter storage is not available on campus.

You also have the option to register your vehicle online and pay to park at metered/visitor parking on campus. Meters can be paid through the Parkmobile app, or by purchasing visitor permits either in person or online at the Michigan Tech Parking Portal.

### **Living Off Campus**

If you are a Michigan Tech student from the local area (Baraga, Houghton, Keweenaw, or Ontonagon counties), you may choose to live at home with your parent/guardian. In your Husky Portal, complete the "Commuter Eligible Housing Survey."

All of the same resources and opportunities are available to students who commute to campus, and we encourage you to take advantage of them and get involved.

Before Orientation, commuter students will receive communication about connecting with staff and getting their questions answered. Students can always email **success@mtu.edu** with any questions or concerns they may have prior to the start of the semester.

As part of Fall Orientation, plan to attend the Commuter Orientation event. Don't miss this opportunity to meet fellow commuters and begin to get connected and involved.

#### Commuter Meal Plans

Commuter students may select from meal options in the residential dining halls or at retail dining locations across campus.

Top Dog Express Plans are available to commuter students and can be purchased and recharged as needed. They are perfect for anyone who spends a mixture of their time eating on campus and cooking at home. Top Dog Express Plans include a set of meals that can be used at The Food Hall at Douglass Houghton Hall, The Eatery at McNair Hall, and The Social House at Wadsworth Hall.

#### **Request Your Final High School Transcript**

An official final high school transcript is required within 30 days of your high school graduation. Request your final transcript through Parchment or contact your high school upon graduation and ask them to send your official transcript showing your final grades and graduation date. Your final transcript will be reviewed by the Admissions Committee to verify continued academic success after the time of your acceptance to Michigan Tech. A significant decline in academic performance during your senior year may affect your enrollment status and, at the University's discretion, may result in a revocation of your admission and any financial assistance awarded.

To be considered official, a transcript must be sent directly to Michigan Tech's Admissions Office by the institution issuing the transcript or from a transcript service such as Parchment. Transcripts stamped "issued to student" or those hand delivered, even if in a sealed envelope, are not acceptable.

#### **Request Your Official College Transcript**

If you completed college-level courses during high school, contact the registrar's office at the participating institution(s) and request that an official transcript with your final grades be sent to Michigan Tech's Admissions Office. Courses will be evaluated for transfer credit. If you are using a third-party transcript service, such as Parchment or National Student Clearinghouse, please make sure to select "Admissions" as the destination.

#### **Submit AP, IB, or CLEP Scores**

Your scores on Advanced Placement (AP), International Baccalaureate (IB), or College Level Examination Program (CLEP) tests may earn you credit or placement. Scores must be sent to Michigan Tech directly from the testing agency.

Go to **mtu.edu/admissions/enroll/ap-ib-clep** to see the list of scores needed to receive Michigan Tech credit.

# Plan for Summer and Fall Orientation

Orientation is the time when you become a Michigan Tech Husky. In addition to meeting fellow new students, you'll become acquainted with campus resources, learn important information about academic and co-curricular opportunities, and connect with current Tech students, faculty, and staff members who are here to support you during your time on campus.

Participation in both Summer and Fall Orientation sessions is required for all new students, regardless of living arrangement. Once you have paid your deposit, you will receive more information about how to register for Summer Session Orientation.

Local accommodations are limited, so please make lodging arrangements early if you have family members or friends traveling with you for Orientation.

#### **Complete Course Placements**

Michigan Tech offers placement assessments to ensure you are beginning your coursework at the right level.

#### Math

Placement in an appropriate initial math course is crucial to your success at Michigan Tech. The Registrar's Office will create your first semester schedule and their goal is to place you into the math course that will provide the best opportunity to complete your degree in four years.

Starting in a math course that is too low may increase your time to graduation. But starting in a course that is too advanced could mean frustration, difficulty understanding important concepts, or retaking courses and increasing your time to graduation.

- 1. Find your recommended first math course. Visit mtu.edu/ math/undergraduate/placement/placement-scores and select your intended major from the drop-down menu to view what scores/credit are needed to place into that course. Tip-your recommended first math course will be highlighted in gold.
- 2. Provide your official score(s)/credit by June 30, 2026. In order to place you into a math course, we need at least one of the following:
  - Official SAT or ACT score
  - AP Precalculus or AP Calculus (AB or BC) credit earned with a qualifying score
  - IB Mathematics (HL) with a qualifying score
  - CLEP Precalculus or Calculus with a qualifying score
  - College transfer credit for college algebra or higher
- 3. If you do not have an official score, or you feel your placement is incorrect, you must take the online ALEKS Math Placement assessment.
  - ALEKS is available online from May 1 until the first day of Fall Orientation
    - Scores are due by June 30 for course registration
  - The \$25 fee includes one (1) initial assessment, unlimited use of the Prep and Learning Module, and up to four (4) additional assessments. Before submitting your payment, we strongly encourage you to use the free trial of ALEKS.
  - Take the ALEKS assessment at apps.mtu.edu/aleks

#### Modern Language

If you plan to continue studying German or Spanish at Tech, you must take the free online Modern Language Placement Exam to be placed into the correct course. #### **Class Schedule**

Your schedule will be created by the Registrar's Office in mid-July based on your major, course placement results, AP/IB/CLEP score(s), and transfer credits received.

Your initial schedule may not reflect full-time status (12 credits or more). Prior to the start of classes, you will be able to add other courses (activities, Essential Education, electives) to complete your fall schedule or make changes after consulting with your academic advisor. Changes may also be made by contacting the Registrar's Office at 906-487-2319 or schedule@mtu.edu

All first-year students are billed as full-time, making you eligible for financial aid. Schedule changes or adjustments may result in additional charges.

#### **Get Your Books**

Once you receive your course schedule, you may order your books online via **bookstore.mtu.edu** prior to the start of the semester. After you place your order, your books will be available for pickup when you arrive on campus.



#### Submit a Photo for Your **HuskyCard**

Your Michigan Tech HuskyCard is your official photo ID, room and building access card, residence hall meal pass, and an on-campus debit card. You'll submit your HuskyCard photo online through Experience at mtu.edu/ experience

You'll receive your HuskyCard during Summer Session Orientation, so make sure to submit your photo by the deadline.

Once on campus, keep your card with you at all times-there is a fee to replace lost or damaged cards.

#### **Express Cash**

The Express Cash debit card program is available as a feature of your HuskyCard. It operates like a debit card for oncampus purchases. After adding funds to your account, you may use your card to make purchases at locations like the Campus Bookstore and University Images, retail dining across campus, campus markets, the Rozsa Center for the Performing Arts Box Office, the Student Development Complex Central Ticket Office, printers and copiers, and some vending machines on campus.

#### **Computing Device** Requirement

All students are required to have a computing device that meets minimum specifications for their major. This will help maximize success in a range of class scenarios, including in-class and remote learning, as well as remote assessment.

If you decide prior to starting classes at Michigan Tech that you would like to change your major, email mtu4u@mtu.edu or call **888-688-1885.** Your application will be reviewed to determine if you meet admissions requirements for the new program. To change your major after the drop/add period, you will work directly with your academic advisor to request changes to your program of study.

#### **Declining Your** Acceptance

If you decide not to enroll at Michigan Tech, email mtu4u@mtu.edu or call **888-688-1885** to let us know. Your notification will cancel your application for admission and your housing application and contract (if applicable). Any scholarships or financial aid awarded to you will also be canceled. In addition, you will stop receiving notifications and reminders from the University. Please note the \$200 enrollment deposit is nonrefundable.

#### **Student Tuition and Paying Your Bill**

Your bill will be available online through the **Experience** web platform at mtu.edu/experience. Please watch your email for the notification once bills are available. This will be the initial bill. Some students may receive a second bill, which will be available during the third week of each semester and will reflect any changes in financial aid, housing, and/or course adjustments made (additions or drops). It is possible to use financial aid to help pay for your books; details will be in your financial aid package.
